


ALASKA OCEAN ACIDIFICATION NETWORK HOSTS WORKSHOP


AOOS HOSTS IOOS ASSOCIATION FALL MEETING

AOOS RECEIVES GRANT AWARDS


AOOS has recently been awarded the following grants:

\$530,000 from the National Academy of Sciences Gulf Research Program - A two year project synthesizing ship tracking data, oil spill model results, and subsistence use information into a unique, interactive tool to aid research and planning in coastal communities bordering the Alaska Beaufort Sea.
